Behind the Make-Up by Patsy "Glitterbug" McMillan

I just re-read an article in the 2000 Calliope that talks about the person behind your clown. We spend so much time perfecting our skills such as balloons, face painting, skits, etc. that we forget that behind our clown persona we are a genuine person. I will admit that sometimes I am so focused on the task at hand (because I have not taken the time to really perfect a specific skill) that spending time with the person I am interacting with goes out the window.

Too many times we hide behind our costume, make-up and jokes to give us the courage to be able to interact with our audience that our natural people side would not allow us to do. But hopefully the more we develop our clown personality it will give us the freedom to let them see who we are behind the make-up.

I was at my granddaughter's school spelling bee this week and noticed a young girl that was so fearful of getting up in front of the audience that she cried every time it was her turn to spell a word and was barely able to

say the letters through her tears. That was me in my elementary, high school and early adult years of my life - every time I was asked to give an oral report of any kind my knees would start to shake and the tears would start streaming down my cheeks. We would both have been grateful for a mask to be able to withstand the glare of everyone staring at us. If nothing else the clown regalia has given me the ability to be able to face an audience with some confidence both in and out of clown.

Sometimes when we are at a gig it is more important for me to break character to assist someone as a person rather than trying to make everything funny. Usually your genuine self will make that person remember the clown behind the make-up therefore making them feel they were important enough that you took the time to interact with them.

A Puddle Full of Purpose by John "John John" Luce

I have spent this summer as I spend most summers trying to define what my purpose as a Clown really is, of course most would say it is to entertain, mystify, educate, or just be the centerpiece of what would be, if not for my presence, an otherwise normal party and for the most part this is true, but..... let me tell you a story.

This tale takes place on a cold October day in rural Pennsylvania when I was left in the custody of my older sister and brother for an afternoon of play. All the elements for my first great adventure were in place. In back of the farmhouse where I lived was a depression in the ground that when it rained would collect water to a depth of about twenty four inches. Next to this great body of water were the remains of a discarded number three washtub which immediately became a ship. My siblings, with imaginations in full flight, seized the moment. They placed the ship at the edge of the water and chose me, a child of four summers, to traverse this great expanse of water as captain of my own vessel while taking no notice of the buckshot size holes in its bottom. With little more than the assurance that they would be there to meet me on the other side, I was shoved from the shoreline only to sink midway across. I remember the feelings that overwhelmed me as this tub rested on the bottom and then continued to fill with water, I remembered the fear as I was instructed to abandon ship. I recall vividly the temperature of the water as it rushed over the tops of my boots. I remember

the hesitation as I prepared to take my first steps toward safety for I didn't know what creatures might lie just below the surface. Most of all I remember the thrill of reaching shore, the tingle of excitement that came over my whole body. This had been an adventure. I had tested my metal and survived. I was a big boy now yearning for my next big challenge.

After that my life became a series of challenges and many times I repeated the boat scenario with the same level of success, but always with the thrill and excitement of previous attempts. What I have learned from a lifetime of being a kid is that life is a ship, and the open water is the adventure. I have learned that there is safety in the harbor and that harbors were built for ships, but that ships were built for the open water. I have learned that as we grow up we tend to tie up to the dock for safety. Sure, from time to time we set our boat a drift, but quickly head for the mooring at the first sign of danger. Most importantly I have learned that life only becomes the thrill and adventure I remember as a child, when I loose the ropes and point the bow toward the open sea. That's why I became a Clown. It was my way of pushing off the shore of adulthood and its security to embark on a journey filled with excitement and danger—of having my ship take on the water of failure only to be bailed out by the bucket of imagination. Then to meet children on the open sea and be part of their adventure, being that I have always been a kid first and then a Clown.

My purpose as a Clown as it turns out is to take a common balloon, fashion it into a ray gun and then with a little imaginative patter transform it into an Extended Barrel Target Master Alien Eradicator. Then all I need do is confirm the existence of Aliens and let the child's mind create their own adventure. To create a crown from a paper plate and give license to a little girl to say, "Hey, you can't ignore me any more I'm royalty", or place a pirate sword in the hand of a six year old knowing with a swipe of the hand the first adversary to be slain will be what that child fears most in life.

My purpose is to create the screen play for an adventure and should I find myself invited to play a part to remember that physical restrictions are the other guy's problem. That my part is provisional and depends upon my ability to leave reality and rational thought behind.

When we became Clowns, we all had a purpose. Finding that purpose was a gift to our self. Fulfilling that purpose is a blessing to everyone around us. Sometimes we get so good at what we do we forget why we do it. We get so caught up in the reality of the moment we forget the joy of childlike thought. Maybe it is time for all of us to set sail once again,, To feel the thrill of childlike imagination. To let a little water run over the tops of our shoes and remember why we became Clowns in the first place.

Bon Voyage, bump a nose and make a memory.



shows or face painting and I rarely have time to go home and take my clown make-up off to go to their party. Nor do I want to.



Kids love to correct this by telling me it is their party or Sally Jeans's party. I then say "thank you, sometimes Greenie the clown gets things mixed up"! They love to have a little power over this adult sized person. I then tell them we are going to do some fun things and I might need some helpers. That is when the support for Greenie the Clown begins. Everyone wants to be a helper. I explain that the birthday child has to help the most because this is their special day. But I want the other kids to know they will be involved in the fun also. If I am face painting, I make a few suggestions. Super hero, Princess, Butterfly, puppy dog. I have lots of other options but this gets their mind working and excited. I am reinforcing that

After I have explained what a REAL CLOWN is I ask them to explain this to their friends. It is also good to tell them how smart they are that they know what a real clown is. Cut Out Those Boring Props by Greg "Zoots" Stanford

Personal cutting machine have become quite popular as of late. There are several models from a couple of different manufactureers, but all have similar functions.

These machine which are a little bigger than a printer can cut a variety of materials from paper to vinyl and sometimes cloth. It's is vinyl that I would like to focus on briefly. There is much variety in vinyl as with anything, but at it's simpliest, there is vinyl that has an adhesive and sticks to things (think stickers) and there's heat transfer vinyl that requires heat (iron, or heatpress) to adhere to cloth.

So, what's this have to do with clowning you may be asking? Well, with a computer and a cutter and some vinyl, you can personalize items with your clown name or logo; you can make a basic magic trick into a trick that fits your theme. You can cut out letters to make a bold, clean cut sign for a skit or a paradeablility. Really, the possibilities are endless.

Don't forget, you can personalize tshirts as give aways or for helpers to wear. You can even add things to your costume.

Vinyl comes in a wide vairety of colors plus metalic and glitter so you can go crazy with your designs.

What can a personal cutter do for you? It can allow you to personalize and theme your props and show with a professional look.
