

Keedo's Prop Shop: Backdrops

about backdrops. They
add so much to
your skit. For
quick & cheap



you can purchase sheets with a design already on them or white ones to draw your own pictures on. I prefer to use muslin. It is heaver and is perfect for paint applications. You may buy it at cloth stores, but I prefer a store called Stage Lights. It sells muslin in a 6-foot width with finished edges for the same price.

I hang my backdrops on a frame made of ¾" PVC pipe. A sheet already has a hem at the top for the PVC pipe to run through. I think the people who sew call this a casing. If you use muslin you will have to sew your own casing. I allow 5" folded in half.


How you attach the sides of your backdrop to the PVC will depend on whether this is a one-time show or a backdrop you will use over & over. You can cut little slits to run tie wraps through. If you need to reinforce this slit make it a buttonhole. Another option found at the Dollar store is an eyelet kit that crimps in metal eyelets with special pliers. One other idea is to sew little strips of cloth to the edges to use as ties.

To paint on muslin I use the bottles of colored craft paints with a brush. You can also thin down this water-based paint and applied it with an airbrush. Spray paint is an oil-based paint that I find messy & harder to control.

To store & transport your backdrop you may fold it or roll it. For rolling buy a larger size PVC pipe and two caps for the ends to be used as a tube. You will avoid the creases from folding and it will be protected from getting dirty. Here's to a more professional look!

- Has the nominee exhibited extraordinary clownmanship?

- How have they displayed being a well-rounded clown? Are they an active volunteer in their community and demonstrates professionalism in the art of clowning?
- How have he/she shown their dedication and promotion of the art of clowning in assisting others?

Nominations will be accepted from active TCA members only. If you would like to verify that your nominee is a current member of TCA please contact our treasurer (Cindy Rice). The nominations will be considered by the TCA Ambassador Committee which is made up of previous recipients who are still active in TCA. The Award will be presented at the Awards Banquet at the annual TCA Convention.

All nominations must be submitted in writing by e-mail or regular mail no later than July 1, 2018. Nominations received and/or postmarked after July 1st will not be considered for the award.

Old Magic Books are Truly Magical by Greg "Zoots" Stanford

It's not a secret, I love books. Specifically, I love old magic books. Now, my collection is still in the beginner stage, but I enjoy adding to it, when I can.

I like to read interviews and bios of more experienced magicians and see what books inspired them when they started or are their go to books now. I then will start searching the Internet for the title or the author and see what I can find. I've stumbled onto some gems for a few dollars.

I think I love the older books because they so often go into such detail on the theory behind the trick and often how to build it yourself. In years past, there was no Internet and unless you were blessed to have a magic store in your area, you either mail ordered it or made it yourself.

Just this week I received a copy of Rice's Encyclopedia of Silk Magic, Vol. 1, from 1948, in the mail. It's so awesome. It's packed, packed full of information and the illustrations in the book are works of art. I was reading an article by illusionist Duane Laflin, and he made reference to the book from his earlier days in magic.

The Tarbell Course in Magic is another gem of a resource. I once read the Harry Houdini had a set of the reference books at his home and he traveled with a set. I've got a copy of the first volume, and hope to one day complete the set...some old books are expensive. :)

More and more, you can find the text of these old books in digital format which is great when researching and planning, but there's nothing like holding a book in my hands while flipping through the pages written in years past.

So if you are looking for ways to spice up your show by using one of your magic props in a different way, check out the trick in an old magic book. As you explore the workings of the trick, your creative juices might help you find new ways to use the trick. And some times, old is new. Young people haven't seen that trick before, or done that way.

That's not to say all my books are from decades past. No, there are tons of great books out there, more being written as we speak. But there's something about the old one. Old magic books truly are magical.

So go ahead, Try it sometime it might make you feel good too, seeing them having a good time. RE-MEMBER you are never too old for Bubbles (no pun intended) Enjoy!!

To Compete or Not to Compete - Part II

The Competitor's Perspective – Preparing for Competition.

Why do people decide to compete when going to convention? The reasons are varied and can be different for every person. Some people like the adrenaline rush. Some people like to do something fun with their clown friends. Others want to get feedback on a performance they have been working on, and still others want a medal at the end of the week. Whatever your reason for choosing to compete there are some things you want to be aware of as you prepare for competition.

- 1. Decide which areas you plan on competing in.
- 2. Once you decide which areas you plan to compete in, go to the TCA website and download the latest competition manual. Read it. Read it again. Read it again. You should know every rule that applies to the areas you are competing in so that you can begin to formulate your competition piece to fit that criteria.
- 3. Be as original as you can be. If you are going to do something that has been done before, put an original spin or twist to it. Make it your own.
- 4. Practice, practice, practice. An audience and a judge can tell if you have put time and energy into your performance.

- 5. After you have put your routine together, get feedback from someone, then polish it up for competition.
- 6. Once at the convention, take the time to go to the competitor's meeting so that you can ask any other questions you might have before the big day.
- 7. Make sure you have props, and music (maybe even a second copy of music), sometimes problems happen with audio be prepared!
- 8. When making props, think about how you can make those everyday people things clowny.
- 9. Don't depend on the props to be funny. Depend on your character. Think about your voice, facial expressions, body movement and the use of the space you have on the stage.
- 10. Connect with the audience. Take the time to look at them, build a relationship with them, this draws them in and makes you real to them. Good luck to all of you as you begin preparing for TCA 2018! Bump a Nose!

I send out the Happi Tymes newsletter to all of the alleys. That way if a clown wants to participate at a gig that's in their area, they maybe more inclined to do so, and are more than welcome! Several of our members are "dual" members who attend two or all three of the alleys. We as clowns participate in as many events a month that we physically, emotionally, or are enabled to do!

Last year we had over 12 gigs that
