"Grab 'em, Shake 'em and Turn 'em Loose"

Working for children is entirely different from working with any other type of audience.

At 1984's TCA Convention in Houston, "Strawberry" (Bill Watts), demonstrated ways to be entertaining. What he said bears repeating, emphasis, expansion. It's not how much you do or how much you spend that makes you entertaining - it's what you say while you are performing (and how you say it). You need to work to keep your audience interested, involved, vocal. Strawberry said, "Grab 'em, shake 'em and turn 'em loose".

You don't want your audience of youngsters to be restless, talk among themselves, get up and wander. To keep your audience interested, get them involved. Give them a definite part in your show. Use audience participation tricks, skits, songs, stories. Use the challenge of a contest to create excitement. Children must blow off steam and it's better for you as a performer if they do it at your convenience. Even if it's only a 1-2-3 countdown, a good warm, noisy response lets the parents/teachers/staff know that you are doing your job to help the kids have a good time.

In a hospital, however, excess noise may be undesirable for the welfare of the patients. Ask. Look around the home/school/auditorium where you are performing. Ask the parents/teachers/staff (as well as the children), "Are we allowed to make noise"? The answer most often will be a resounding "Yes"! After all, that's why you're there - to entertain the kids. Let them be loud. You can pretend that you can't hear them. You can tell them that you need their help to wake your "sleeping" dog, cat or rabbit. Don't, however, carry this to such an extreme that they will strain their throats, cry, or get hysterical.

And don't expect spontaneous applause. You may even have to ask for applause - - not for yourself, of course, but for your very clever dog, cat, or rabbit, or for the child who became your impromptu assistant. When you call upon a child to assist you ask what his/her name is. Hearing his/her name is important to anyone and is especially so to a child. A child's name is one of the first things he/she is taught to say and to respond to. It is the first thing he/she recognizes that makes him/her different from Continued on Page 9

Continued from Page 8 other children. It is his/her first realization of individuality.

Another thing that you will need to consider when entertaining is the approximate age of your audience. The younger the children, the more difficult it will be to keep their attention. The techniques for entertaining three year olds are different from the techniques for entertaining ten years olds (especially at birthday parties). You can do things FOR ten year olds, but you have to do things WITH three year olds.

You may want to do an hour's show but it may be more practical to do a smashing, scintillating half-hour show instead. "Grab 'em, shake 'em, and turn 'em loose".

A good opening is of tremendous importance to any show and this is especially true of a show or party designed for children. You will want them to think right from the start, "This is going to be fun"! And you will strive to sustain this enthusiasm until you finish.

Take a tip from our friends in scouting and KISMIF Translated, this phrase means, Keep It Simple, Make It Fun! Keep your preparation time, set up time, pack up time all down to a minimum. Try to use things that are inexpensive to use and easy to prepare. Try to use things that can be given away (balloons, Afghan bands, paper hats, paper trees, cut ropes, etc).

Try to keep your program going smoothly. After your big opening, alternate your games, tricks, skits, songs, stories, puppets, etc. so that you will have livelier activities interfaced with somewhat quieter ones. Don't drag your program out until it ceases to be fun. Stop before that point - - leave them wanting more. Prepare a strong finish for your performance. A skit or trick with a surprise ending could fill the bill. "Grab 'em, shake 'em. and turn 'em loose".

Mark Wilson, the talented magician, writes that he considers the real secret of entertaining children successfully is, "Fractice makes perfect". To really learn to perform for children, you must perform for children. The best way to learn to entertain children is from experience. You must perform many shows, and you will learn something from each show. If an activity goes well and is Continued on Page


Don apologized for not having a report due to the 1985 convention work and other pressing duties. He submitted his resignation as chairperson.

THE VIEW FROM THE FIRST OF MAY

My chest was heaving and my heartbeat felt like it was three timmes as fast as normal; my palms were sweating and my ears were ringing. I felt like I had just completed my first marathon race when I awoke. It was all a dream. More like a nightmare, really. I was dreaming about my first clown performance. Wide awake, I recalled that same performance. It was very much like the dream. My adrenaline level must have been extremely high, and that was strictly from the anticipation. After my introduction my nerves were really on fire. The other clowns in the show were very helpful and most reassuring; however, I had never been more scared in all of my life. I didn't have what anyone would call an "act" and was mostly just supposed to help the other clowns with their skits. They were all sure I would do 'just fine'. Iwondered how they could know that, when I was so sure that I would be awful.

I somehow managed to survive that ordeal and afterwards the entire event was little more than a blur to me. My nerves finally settled and I decided that I must have beenalright. After all, no one threw anything at me during the show. Several days later I had the opportunity to view the show on video tape. I found out then why no one had thrown anything at me - I spent most of my time either behind one of the other clowns or nearly off the side of the stage. They couldn't have hit me if they had wanted to throw something. But, all in all, I was 'OK'. At least I didn't mess up anything or anyone else's part. Mostly I had a very valuable learning tool, and that harrowing experience was behind me.

As I continued my reflection, I began thinking about the shows that followed that first experience. Suddenly, I realized that every time I perform I experience the same sort of symptoms. Please don't tell me that I will get over it in time because I'm convinced that I won't. Also, I believe that just possibly those symptoms will make me more aware of my performance quality and reception and just might help to make me a better clown. That is, if I live through it enough times.

I went back to sleep.


