National Clown Week (August 1st through the 7th for the uninitiated among us) is almost upon us. What do you as an individual, or you as a group have planned that could be considered special for this time? There are many things which clowns could do to promote this special week which should be used to let the general public know that there is someone out there available to put a smile on not only their lips, but on their hearts as well.

The general practice for most of us groupwise is to go out and solicit proclamations from the mayor, city manager, or whatever form of local government that pertains to you, the county governing person or body, and of course, our Governor. In some respects these diverse bodies at times move somewhat rapidly. Usually, however, in an instance such as this which could be considered non-political they don't move that fast. Therefore, when something of this nature is requested it is a good idea to get your requests in early (at least a month ahead of time) for a proclamation for your area or group. Copying and displaying these proclamations wherever the general public will see them is a good way to get recognition. If at all possible see if our local newspaper will print these with either a brief item about you or your alley.

This is also the best time of the year to go out and contact the local hospitals, nursing homes, senior citizens groups, or other institutions in your area which are havens for the unfortunates among us. Volunteering in these institutions not only brings joy to those less fortunate than us, (after all, we are exceptionally blessed to be able to do this) but will bring a lot of joy and satisfaction into our lives as well. There are many souls who are confined to these institutions who were previously able to perform for others as we are still able, but are now handicapped in one way or another. Put yourself in their shoes for a moment and ask yourself, "How would I feel if I were incapacitated in any way?" Your editor personally knows of several of these folks right here in Houston, and I'm sure there are others possibly in your area too.

Clowns are traditionally supposed to be a caring, sharing lot, so let's get out this year and spread some of our cheer to those less fortunate. After all, if we are any good at all as performers we can always pick up a birthday continued next page

In whatever endeavor you may undertake during National Clown Week may it be the best ever for you and may your satisfaction from it be boundless! Happy clowning!



Our convention will consist of workshops and seminars for the clowns at the La Quinta Royale Hotel. There will be a hospitality suite for the clowns at the hotel. There will be a banquet Saturday night with great food and fantastic entertainment, and also an auction.

There will be a competition session which is open to the public. Competition will be a walk through judging on makeup and costuming of each type of clown. GAGS & STUNTS

Here are a couple of stunts you might want to incorporate into your repetoire as is or possibly modified. As you know, there aren't too many new ideas - just different versions of old ones. However, the old ones always got a laugh no matter how many times you saw them.

The Pie Stunt:

Start with an aluminum pie pan. Cut a circle out of a piece of 3/4 inch thick plywood to fit the bottom of the pie pan. Then cut a "V" shape out of the circle and paint what is left yellow. Staple or tack the plywood circle to the bottom of the pan. Cut a rubber band from an old inner tube 1/2 inch wide and 2 feet long and attach it firmly to the bottom of the pie pan. Tie a loop on the other end so that it will go around your wrist. Cover the plywood with shaving cream.

One clown chases another toward the crowd. Clown with pie" throws it first, and the other clown ducks. "Pie" goes toward the crowd, but stops and returns to the thrower. Carry a can of shaving cream along so the pie can be repaired.

Walk around trying to sell eggs. A plant in the crowd heckles you about them being fresh, or whatever. You finally get mad and throw one into the audience at him. (A blown egg filled with confetti) Be sure you pick the right egg. Better yet, have them all filled with confetti except one or two which you could "accidentally" drop for effect.

Just let us know, we'll get you involved. We have already issued an invitation to the junior clowns to come in wardrobe and assist as stagehands during the competition. We want our young joeys to feel they are contributing and to know that this is their club also. Which it is!

-Badges - is there a fellow joey out there in the business? We have presented an idea for badges for the convention to the T.C.A. board - we will not get a decision on this at least until the next board meeting on July 27th, so if there is a T.C.A. joey out there who is in the specialty advertising business and can give us a good price on badges, please contact us; we will tell you the type badges we have in mind and maybe we

can get the badges for the convention in the making. -Convention Photographer - The reason a city goes all out to host conventions is for the revenue for their city, but the bottom line is the cost and saving money (especially when the budget is tight). I say this because my asking if there is a joey out there who is also a photographer and would like to become involved by being the convention photographer, is not to take the revenue away from my city, but to get the most reasonable price possible as well as giving a fellow joey who is in the business a chance to become involved in the convention.

-Promote the fact that we are going to have a caricaturist at the convention, scheduled to be on hand during the time that all will be in wardrobe. The prices are very reasonable and the caricaturist can also do a portrait as well as a caricature.

THINK ABOUT IT !!

Keep trying --- it's often the last key that opens the door.

If you don't learn anything from your mistakes, then there's no sense making them.

If you're kicking up a storm, you can't expect clear sailing.

Even a fool is counted wise if he holds his peace.

To do two things at once is to do nothing.

Plan every move and keep your thinking ahead of your work.

No man ever became so well educated that he couldn't learn more from time and experience.

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MIND READING

In place of the usual "clown magic" at a party, or along with at least, here is something, especially for some of the older children which will give them something to think about afterwards. There are many simple to do mind reading stunts. Here's one for starters. It is called, color clair-voyance.

The performer proves (by magician's logic) that he can distinguish between colors without seeing them.

Display several wax crayons of the sort that children use with coloring books. "Magic," you begin, "is sometimes very useful. When I'm driving my car I never need to look at a traffic light to know whether it is red, green, or yellow. I just guess - and I'm always right. I'll show you."

Put your hands behind your back, and turn away from the audience. "Select one of the crayons and give it to me behind my back." When this has been done, face the audience again.

Behind your back, dig the nail of the middle finger of your right hand into the end of the crayon and scrape off a small piece of the colored wax. Bring this hand to the front, place it against your forehead, and concentrate. If you keep the fingers curled inward as your hand moves up to your forehead, you can spot the particle of crayon under the fingernail, and note its color.

Don't name the color immediately; that makes it look too easy. Pretend that what you are doing is difficult, and that you really are receiving faint mental impressions. Also, as should be done in most mind-reading tricks, give the information out piecemeal. "I get the impression of a light color ... yellow, perhaps, or orange ... I feel it more clearly now ... the color is yellow!" This adds suspence and is dramatically effective.

Finally, prove that the trick wasn't just a lucky guess by doing it again once or twice.

You could also use a different helper each time to prove that there was no set-up or coercion with any of your prior helpers.


Banquet (menu selected) has been finalized, except for headcount, with hotel.

While to be sure, circus performances have been produced without such basic ingredients as bareback ridres and elephants, no big top enterpreneur has dared to present a circus without clowns.

From the time the very first circus performance was given near the Centre-House in Philadelphia on Saturday, August 27, 1885, when "between the different parts a clown amused the spectators", a comic character variously referred to as a merry andrew, pantomimest, jester, and other synonyms, has been very much in evidence in the sawdust ring.

The evolution of clowning has made a most interesting study for the collector of circusiana - and circus clowns have been the inspiration for many books, thereby providing a host of items for the collector.

In the beginning of the circus in America, the clown was a singular person. For decades after the circus was firmly entrenched in the American amusement seeker's heart, not even the largest of traveling big top organizations boasted of more than one clown. Furthermore, such clowns as Joe Pentland, Dan Rice, and Den Stone, not only received top billing in the circuses in which they were featured, but each of them became a circus owner in his own right, and Stone is credited with operating the first railroad circus in America during the season of 1854.

The clown in those days was a most versatile fellow. Singing was one of his specialties and certain clowns were identified by their audiences through the songs they made popular. Those were the days when circus songsters were sold in the arena. Each of these little paper-backed pamphlets contained a number of songs which the circus clowns sang.

The clown also exchanged smart repartee with the ringmaster as the butt of his jokes. He often was a bareback rider, and in most cases, a tumbler as well.

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When the circus branched out to embrace two rings and three rings, a multitude of clowns, depending upon the size, of the show, began to populate the arena. And as the big tops grew, the talking clown was on the way out, for no longer were the crowds which attended circuses able to hear the words of his songs and the dialogue in which he had engaged with the ringmaster, because of the vast size of the arena.

Thus, the pantomimic clown replaced the talking clown, and the funmakers depended on acting out situations to create laughs. Clown numbers generally, are divided into three types. First, there is the walkaround. In such a number, practically all of the clowns of the contingent parade around the hippedrome track, each striving to create a laugh by the garb he wears, the gadget he carries, or the vehicle he rides. Then there is what is known as a stop number. In this situation, one or more clowns working together, act out a pantomime which creates laughs. And finally, there is the production number, such as the clown band, the comic wedding, the adam smasher and other in which all the available clowns participate.

In most circuses, there is a principal or producing clown, who is responsible for all the clown numbers and directs all the activities of all the joeys. In the largest of the circuses, there may be several producing clowns each of which furnishes the properties and costumes and imay have several working for him. There have even been producers of clown numbers, who never appear in costume or grease paint, but create the acts and situations and employ men to work with their props.

The increase in the number of clowns in a circus has brought a greater variety of makeup and dress to clown alley. There are two types of clowns, one the white-faced and the other, the character clown.

The white-faced jester is the older, stemming from the theater of the days before the circus came into being as an amusement enterprise. For the most part clowns of the white-facedvariety wear white one or two-pieced costumes, trimmed with bright color combinations, going back to the Pierrot type of dress.

The white faced clown uses a white background on his face, which is lined with red and black makeup pencils. Each clown adopts a makeup which he usually waers year after year and is identified in the profession by it. Thus the ardent circus fan recognizes clowns of their acquaintanceship through their makeup while cavorting among dozens of other funny fellows in the ring.

The character clown on the other hand, depends upon comical dress, wigs, and theatrical type of makeup to distinguish himself from the white-faced clown. There are several types of popular character clowns to be found in most every circus, depending of course, upon the size of the show and number of clowns on the payroll.

One of the stock circus characters is the clown policeman. He dates back to the beginning of multiple-ringed circuses, and there are so many clown policemen in circusdom, that this writer saw three of them in one indoor circus during the past winter season.

Another character, made famous by Emmett Kelly in the last two decades, is the tramp comic. While the tramp comedian predated Kelly's entrance into the field of clowning, his type of makeup and wardrobe has been copied by numerous funmakers, and there is rarely a circus with as many as four or five clowns today, that does not have a tramp comic in the lineup.

Female impersonators are also popular, as are the rustic hayseed types wearing linen dusters, chin whiskers, and smoking corncob pipes. A combination of white makeup and character studies are the auguste and grotesque types, the wearers usually adding wigs for the effects they try to achieve. Felix Adler and Lou Jacobs, are well known clowns who use the grotesque and auguste types of makeup respectively.

There have been racial types of comics too, but these have about passed out of the picture. The Dutch comic type was for many years the typical comedian of aerial bar acts, and Jewish comic characters had their inning, Herman Joseph being one of the most successful and best known. He retired from the profession 20 years ago.

In addition to appearing in the arena and on the hipcontinued next page

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podrome track in clown number, comedians of the circus have played other important parts in the circus. Clowns like the late Milt Taylor were employed to stand at the circus connection or entrance to the big top from the menagerie, to shake hands with the children. And so-called comein clowns have long been circus fixtures. These have been female impersonators or rube clowns, who entertained early arrivals, by their antics before the show started.

Clowns have also taken parts in various types of acts. For example, the noted Poodles Hanneford, introduced a type of comic character in bareback riding acts, which has been widely copied. Hanneford wears baggy clothes, red wig, a minimum of makeup, and an ever present coonskin overcoat.

There have been comedians on the aerial bars, in flying return acts, on the trampoline, comedy acrobatic acts and comedians on the tight and slack wires. In fact, there are few of the standard circus acts which have not been burlesqued in some form or other by comedians.

And when the roll of the circus world's outstanding performers is called, the names of several clowns are near the top of the list.
