I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday and that your new year is starting out great!



Fiesta Bones



3 tablespoons water

4 cups wheat flour

1/2 cup cornmeal

1 medium egg

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 cup chopped sun dried tomatoes

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced cilantro

Mix ingredients with spoon to combine, then knead by hand. Roll out into half inch thick sheet. With 2 1/2 inch bone-shaped or other appropriately shaped cookie cutter, cut out ~30 cookies. Place on baking sheet sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Bake at 375 degrees about 50 minutes. Cool on rack. Store in sealed container.

These make tasty healthy snacks for your puppy dog!



Attitude, The Elements, and Therapeutic Clowning

One question that has persisted since I began practicing Intentional Foolishness is, what EXACTLY is Therapeutic Clowning? What is the essence of a clowning or humor intervention, and what makes it different from hundreds of other therapeutic techniques?

Clowning in its best sense springs from a positive regard toward people. It gets its magic by being open to the multifarious possibilities in people and the moment. The attitude of clowning is to enjoy possibilities, even those that might be regarded as patently obvious or divinely absurd. Clowning engages in an attitude toward life called play, even in unlikely situations.

For all of us, our attitudes are made visible in our body language. The stylized body language of a clown is recognized by a state of animation, of expectancy and openness. In technical clown-talk, the **theoretical** attitude of play is made visible in **body language** known as body attitude. These two components together are what are referred to as clown attitude.

Therapeutic Clowning is a gentle variety of clowning that begins with an invitation to "come our and play." It presumes a non-judgmental willingness to go and be with a person on whatever their road is for a while. At its best, it can bring a safe and positive place for a healing flight of fantasy.


Therapeutic Clowning is just one vehicle for carrying energy that we try to use in a positive or healing fashion. It is a "niche" in the arena of seeking to make a connection with a person for the intention of therapeutic benefit. And it has the gift of coming to us in an enjoyable manifestation that often includes laughter.

Clown attitude seismically affects what happens in Therapeutic Clowning. To be just dressed in a clown outfit with make-up on but not be inside the clown character by way of interactive intention and physical body attentiveness, fundamentally changes the outcome of an encounter. It is the clown attitude that lets the costume and make-up take on a new dimension.

Clown attitude comes alive by the use of the elements of novelty, color, exaggerated movement, non-verbal/limited verbal communication, appropriate touch, sense of play, and the luxury of focused attention. Respectful use of these elements often gives the clown in persona a license to step beyond the superficial into a realm of trust usually reserved for a few special relationships.

Clown attitude is what makes the niche of Therapeutic Clowning work. Use of the elements is what disciplines clown attitude, and actually creates and gives life to the clown persona.

Korey Thompson, a therapeutic clown practitioner, lives in Milwaukee. She is the author of a program used in healthcare settings called Exercise Foolishness, which integrates the physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual dimensions of the individual. Recently, she has been involved in the start of a program at Children's' Hospital of Wisconsin, in conjunction with the International Clown Hall of Fame and Research Center.

Clowns in the Past

For every joker there must be a "jokee," someone to be the victim. Thus it did not take long before the fun loving whiteface clown found a target for his pranks. This clown, the Auguste, became a common side-kick and often a scene stealer for the whiteface.

How the name "Auguste" came to be used is a matter of conjecture. It is known that the word is a German colloquialism for peasant or clod. But legend has it that an early circus performer played a joke on his employer by appearing in front of a German audience wearing the most outlandish, ill-fitting clothes he could find. The resulting roars of laughter and applause were accompanied by shouts of "Auguste." So it is said that the term came to be associated first with the the clothes usually worn by the Auguste rather than with the type of make-up. The clothes are too big, too small, or a combination of both.

Today, circus people use the term "Auguste" to describe a personality type rather than the outward appearance. Whether he is a grinning simpleton or a ragged tramp, he is an Auguste if he is the butt of the joke...someone else's or his own!

In the modern era, several famous auguste superstars have studded the galaxy of clowndom.

The Auguste who personified the famous Bertam Mills Circus in England for many years was Nikolai Poliaklff,

known to thousands of British children as "COCO." Coco's trademark was his wild red wig which would stand on end at the touch of a hidden control.

Another of the most famous Augustes during the first half of the 20th century was Adrain Wettch, known as "GROCK." He was one of the few clowns to be successful both on the stage and in the circus ring. His stage shows consisted of an uninterrupted one hour performance, including a skit he made famous which consisted of a hilarious attempt to paly a miniature violin. At first he seemed unsure what it was supposed to do, then achieving some horrendous squawks, and finally ending with a virtuoso performance.
