

I have been a clown for over 36 years. Well, I have dressed as a clown for over 36 years. My inner clown has been with me all my life. Over the years, I have had the amazing opportunity to meet some amazing mentors, teachers, role models and friends in the industry. There are way too many to name, but suffice it to say, I have met some of the greatest. One of my proudest associations is to be in the inner circle of the Red Nosed Round Table. My friends Margaret Clauder and Susan Keys recommended my acceptance in this power group, and I am forever grateful and honored to be included.

I would like to mention three specific clowns that mean a great deal to me. First and foremost, of course is my husband, Dal Sanders. For 40 years he represented a major corporation as "The World's Most Famous Clown". Everything...and I mean everything that I am today as a performer, I learned from this talented man. Second is Kelly Ballagh. Another natural talent with so much personality and humor. He is a great friend to all and is willing to share his knowledge and talents with everyone. Third is the late great Leon McBryde. He may not be here anymore to share his love, but his mark on the clown and performance world will never leave.

I would love to write more about this loving man, Leon McBryde, but I think I will let Kelly Ballagh do it for me. Kelly wrote this beautiful tribute to him a few days after his passing. Enjoy!

From Facebook by Kelly Ballagh:

I've often pondered this moment in time, where I would sit back and put down in words what Leon McBryde meant to me. How would I describe the monumental mark that he left in my life by being a part of it, or the impact that his "words of wisdom" had on a young kid just starting to find his way in the sawdust scattered world of the Circus. What follows is my feeble attempt to pay tribute to my dear friend, mentor and epitome of a master clown.

Every moment I look back on my wondrous journey as a professional clown, this gentle giant of a man was there casting his shadow down upon me in guidance. From the very first time I meet him at his home in 1999, Leon saw a spark in me and fanned that to keep it burning. I was just a young sprout taking root in this new world of clowning, but he wanted me to succeed like he had done before. He guided me and helped shape me into the Ringling Brothers Circus Clown that I became, and for that I will be forever grateful.

Along my circus journeys, every chance I had to visit him and Linda at their home in Virginia I would. I was coming "home" to the birthplace of my clowning, enveloped in the stories he would tell of Mark Anthony or Lou Jacobs traveling in the by gone era of the circus. Hours "talking shop" would pass by like a gentle breeze in the air as we sat out back of his home, watching the James River flow below us in the valley. And after breakfast, I would venture out to the Nose Factory and watch as the beloved ProKnows brand

was being painstakingly manufactured right before my very eyes. What an incredible life that Leon had opened my eyes to!

As my circus days came to a close after 7 years, Leon was yet again there to push me into the next chapter of my clowning. He saw that the knowledge I had learned while traveling on the circus was a valuable asset that could be shared with others. He invited me to share what I had learned by coming to his Advance Studies camp, thus passing along the art of clowning to the future generations. I am the instructor and mentor that I am today because of what he instilled in me. His guidance showed me that I was so much more than I even thought I could be, and by sharing my knowledge I kept the art of clowning alive.

*** SIDE NOTE: It was at this very camp back in 2008 that I first met Becky, so you could say that Leon was also a matchmaker and helped "bring us together".



Moving forward, these memories that we share will create a ripple effect through all that knew him. Stories will be shared, laughs will be had, and a little bit of Leon will shine bright through all that he touched. His legacy will live on. Every time we see a ProKnows meticulously placed on a clown's face or see a Santa with that extra special twinkle in his eye, you'll know Leon's been there. He's become a part of all of us that knew him. With him gone, it's now our job to continue what he taught us.

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The Stars and Stripes

July is a great Month. We all get excited about parties, events, July 4th face painting designs, freshen up our balloon shapes and creations. We all have high expectations for the holiday gigs.

But July is something else. It is a great month to take a closer look at the American Flag. Most are aware that the 50 stars represent the number of states in the country, and 13 stripes signify the original colonies, but there are some facts that we may not be aware of.

The flags colors stand for bravery and valor (red), innocence and purity (white), and justice, perseverance and vigilance (blue). Modified each time a state joined the country, its last star was added when Hawaii was incorporated, and the design has been in use for years.

The flag has a few nicknames, including "Old Glory", the Stars and Stripes and per our national anthem, the star-spangled banner. It merits its own code of use, which outlines when and how it should be displayed, lowered, passed and properly retired. It is acceptable to wear clothing with the flag design on them. The flag itself should not be worn. It is against code to display tattered flags. Flags can be repaired and washed for re-hanging.

When displaying a flag vertically, the blue swag should be in the top left to the viewer's eye. Flying the flag half staffed is a decision only the president or state governors are allowed to make. Visit resources for more flag facts and ettiquettte!!

Alternatives in the Art of Clowning

One of the pleasurable things about clowning for me, is the variety and possibility of things to do as a clown. That is not to say, that as a Joey you try all of then, but as clowns do grow older in years and develop physical disabilities, there are alternatives to what we are physically able to do.

From personal experience, I loved to be in parades. It seemed like we did, what I called a rick rack motion (going from one side of the street to opposite. I am talking small town here,). This entailed twice as far as other walking participants. So...We started out at the beginning of the parade and by the time that we completed the two mile parade route, we were "bringing up the rear".

ALTERNATIVE: If possible, ride on or in something. It is not nearly as much fun, but be creative with how you decorate, react and indicate you ARE having fun etc.

My second love was room visits at Children:s Hospitals and room visits on designated floors in hospitals and Nursing Homes and Rehab facilities. This of course was with consent of Hospital Administration. After experiencing two knee replacements, more birthdays and general physical limitations, that had to change.

ALTERNATIVE: Instead of room visits, do Special Events at those facilities. The event is usually in a dining area or lobby, so you can stay in one small designated place. For example, do Face Painting or balloons (if permissible), clown patter with a puppet, glitter tattoos, etc.

I/we used to do Fun Runs, Charity Events, and Corporate Events. Too much walking! So, do we give up clowning? No way!

ALTERNATIVE: Come up with a way that you can sit or stand in one place to do "your thing." Example: "Clown Merry- Go Round". (See attached diagram.)

Birthday Parties were super fun, but again, as we ourselves age, there are more limitations. Some of these limitations are distance traveled, going to unfamiliar neighborhoods, personally no Sunday events, no night driving, no longer having a partner etc.

ALTERNATIVE: When contacted by a possible client, be up front with what you will/can do. My limit is a twenty mile radius from my home. I do daytime events only, and preferably with a partner, I am particular about facilities (I want to know in door or out door, Plan B for weather, shade in summer, good lighting at evening, (with a partner who drives), I provide a Contract with ALL agreed upon situations, mailed to them in plenty of time prior to the event, (I keep a copy for myself.) I stick to the length of time agreed upon, unless they request more time (then I request more money,). If I am not familiar with the location, I do a trial run one day prior, so that it is not frustrating hunting for the location. (This is especially helpful if you don't have a GPS, or if there is construction in the area.)

One of my college professors, long before I became a clown, had a saying: "Expect the unexpected." In other words, have a Plan B. If what you used to do does not work now, "think out of the box." Go BUMP. A NOSE!

Another Alternative

COWTOWN, CLOWNS, "MERRY-GO WALK, AROUND"

This can be used for four people or five people at an event where YOU can stay seated or stand in one spot, instead of walking around yourself. The children do the "walking".

ADVANTAGES:

- 1. You can stay in one place, for example Mayfest. (Physical n limitations: distance, walkers or canes (frees up a hand for trick etc)
- 2. Clowns will be close together. Several advantages- safety, take a RR break, you don"t have to carry your supplies.
- 3. I have a Pull Cart that has a lid. I can place water bottles in it, my personal ID, car keys etc., and whatever I would be using for a "walk around". I could even have more than one thing, to be able to trade off as the event proceeded into the next hour or two.
 - 4. There is flexibility on the number of clowns participating..
 - 5. Each clown would have a different presentation: for instance -

Clown A - Tricks

Clown B - Glitter. Tattoos

Clown C - Puppet/ puppets

Clown D - Simple balloons

Each clown could have a roll of his/her own stickers

SET. UP

1. A chair for each clown. (See diagram)

This could be stacking lawn chairs, or folding chairs positioned in a circle, equidistant from each other, facing outward. (See Diagram)

Each clown would have a sign at his/her spot: Permanent signs on tag board. (Possibly laminated for more use)

3. Merry Go

Round. -

(For four clowns with COWTOWN CLOWNS sign in center)

Walk -

Around

4. COWTOWN

CLOWNS.

(For five clowns)





- 1. Something to hold each sign at the clown spot
- 2. A "connecting" rope or safety sash, for between chairs
- 3. Transportation (with equipment) to designated spot for Set Up







Evolution

Evolution n. The act of evolving, adapting, or changing for the purpose of improving.



We should strive to keep evolving. Don't think of it as change, no one likes change, everyone tries to avoid that. We all get comfortable having familiar things and friends around us, but we should seek out the unfamiliar. We should all try to do things that are different. New things keep life exciting. It is said that if you always do what you've always done you will only get what you've always got. Sometimes we should try to do things differently, even if it's only a little different. Often the results will be surprising. Next time you clown up try changing the order, or the way you apply your makeup. Next time you do a birthday party or a stage show use a different order of items in the show.

Try to learn a new skill. If you have never face painted, or are afraid of balloons give them a try.





Do you juggle? If you do, learn a new pattern or add another object. If you can't, take a seminar or get a friend to help you learn the ropes.



If magic is your interest, pick up a new trick or give an old favorite a new twist or ending.

Sure, what you're doing probably works, but maybe it could

work better. You'll never know unless you give it a try. Experiment, make an effort to do things you wouldn't normally do. Maybe at the alley meetings you should attempt to speak and interact with everyone attending, not just your close clown friends. Strive to do this in your everyday routine. Smile and say hello to EVERYONE. It sounds easy but... Well, I digress, if we keep experimenting and then sort out what works and what doesn't we will determine the best way to meet our goals (entertaining kids of all ages). The methods and ways we come up with will also be the easiest, fastest, and most entertaining way of doing things.

We should all try to evolve, and thank heaven for evolution, because if it wasn't for evolution I would look like I did when I first became a clown, and that was scary.
