# A "How To" Guide -Making Your Own Clown Wardrobe

If you are a new clown, a clown on a budget, or a very creative clown, you might be wondering how to make your own costume without spending a bundle. Do you sew or know someone who sews? If you do, here are some tips for putting a new clown wardrobe together.

Start with a pattern. If you look in the Simplicity or McCall's pattern books, you'll likely not find a clown costume pattern other than the Halloween variety. What you have to do is shop with clown eyes. What pattern would make a good pair of pants or bloomers? Look at pajama pants or shorts with an elastic waist. What about collars? Look at blouses or dresses with large collars or bows. Baby doll tops are very popular right now. They can be made from bright fabrics, add some pockets, and Voilal You've got a clown top. How about a vest? Typical vest patterns can be made with fun fabrics to become quite "clowny." Look at apron patterns. Those can be adapted to become overskirts or pinafores.

You probably want to consider purchasing your pattern in a larger-than-usual size. Traditionally, pajama pants, aprons, and many skirts don't have pockets. Add side seam pockets as well as patch pockets to make your wardrobe pieces more functional.

What about fabrics? Poly/cotton blends are easiest to care for. Lighter weight fabrics can be used for blouses, but if they are thin, you must line them. Stay away from: 1) rayon and rayon blends - limp, 2) open weave fabrics - stretch out of shape and shrink, 3) 100% cotton - fades, wrinkles, and must iron, and 3) anything needing to be dry cleaned - expensive.

For pants and vests - Trigger (a durable poly/cotton blend) seems to be the most resilient. It comes in a variety of bright colors and washes well. You will probably want to line your pants or vests with cotton broadcloth for comfort. Don't forget, shorter makes for more fun clown pants. You want them to see your socks!

Remember to add "back interest" to your costume. Large buttons or bows on the back of your vest will add some pizzazz. Pin these on for ease in laundering. Striped, bright colored, or checkered suspenders will add fun to your wardrobe as well.

When you make your vest, keep in mind that you'll want inside pockets and large armholes. Use snaps, frogs or hook and loop closures. Shirts go on AFTER you are in makeup, so watch necklines - maybe add a zipper.

Hat examples are available in the pattern catalogs or try using a hat form and covering it with a complimentary fabric. Add ribbons, ric rack, bows, feathers, flowers and bling.

These hints work well for Whiteface and Auguste clowns, but what about Tramps or Hobos? Visit your local resale shop and search for old suits. You can probably get one for under \$10. Several things can be done to distress it: wash it in the washing machine, run over it with the car, use sand paper on it, splatter paint on it. I've even heard of shooting it with buckshot. Sew on elbow and other patches of mismatched fabrics. Add a frayed piece of rope for a belt, holey socks, worn out shirt, and an old hat to finish it off. Don't forget to make the inside of the jacket distressed, too. The key here is to look old and dirty, not be old and dirty.

If clown shoes are not in your budget right now, start with decorated sneakers. Use fabric paints, sequin patches, beads, bright laces, lacy laces, etc. Wait on buying your clown shoes until you find your true character.

Hopefully, these hints and tips have been helpful in getting you on the right path to making your own clown costume. Now . . . put your face on, get out there and clown!
